

The Voice of the Pastor

My Dear Fathers, brothers and Sisters,

Today more than ever people want the priests to be witnesses of Christ in whose priesthood they share. They want the priests to be close to God and close to them. They expect a connectivity between what they do and what they say. There are a few elements which the priests must keep in mind:



First and foremost the priests are disciples

of Jesus who called them to be with him like the Apostles who left everything behind and followed him. The priests are called to deny themselves and take up their daily cross and follow him (cfr.Lk 9:23) which means a journey to death that is certain. In the second place the priests are apostles who are sent on a mission. Like the twelve apostles who were sent to proclaim the good news to the whole creation (cfr. Mk 16/15) and especially like Paul the priests are sent to proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord and ourselves as your slaves for the sake of Jesus (2 Cor 4:5). In the third place the priests are elders who have certain traits: Responsible for the people entrusted to them, blameless, not to be arrogant, gentle, temperate, hospitable, good-loving, prudent, upright, devout and self controlled. They must have a firm grasp of the world that is trust worthy in accordance with the teaching, so that they may be able both to preach with sound doctrine and refute those who contradict it (cfr. Tit 1:6-9). They represent the church in the world and be a part of it and therefore they should avoid all their innovations and likes and dislikes. They should feel one with the church (Sentire cum Ecclesia).

In the fourth place, they preside over the Eucharistic celebration which is the source and summit of the life of the church. Though it is not merely their total task but it is central to the priesthood. As the Eucharist is the centre of the priestly ministry of the priests and the heart of their priesthood they gather the church in the name of Jesus to praise and thank God together in the Church.

The Priests should realize the truth that they take the place of Jesus Christ in the midst of the community, the church until Jesus comes and take to heart the specific and significant role they play in the church for the salvation of humankind. Then they will be able to face the challenges that come on this way.

- Month of Souls: All the Priests, in November, are exhorted to teach the faithful on the importance of Eternal Life and praying for the souls in need of God's mercy and forgiveness. Kindly enlighten the faithful to visit the cemeteries and pray for the souls throughout this month. A plenary indulgence is obtained by one who during the first nine days of November visits the cemetery and prays for the souls fulfilling the three usual conditions, namely Confession, participation in Holy Mass and prayer said for the Holy Father. - ii) Congratulations to Fr. Paul Raj for the renovation of the parochial church at Silukkuvarpatti which was blessed by His Grace on 18th Oct. 2019.
- iii) Conrgatulations to **Fr. Cyprian** for the renovation of the Church and the erection of a Flag Mast at Panthalkudi, Aruppukottai Parish which were blessed by His Grace on 19th Oct. 2019.
- 10. Excardination: Fr. Arul Valan (2018) and Fr. M. Paul (2018), as per their request, after the excardination of the Archdiocese of Madurai, were incardinated into the respective Dioceses in United States of America. The Archdiocese of Madurai thanks them for their whole hearted and dedicated service and contribution to the Archdiocese of Madurai for so many years and in various capacities, and wishes them all the best in their ministries at their respective Dioceses in US.

11. Discussion and Deliberation at the Senate on 22-10-2019:

The following are the discussions and deliberations that took place at the Senate:

- A. Action Plan for the previous Meeting held on 23rd November 2018.
- a) A common Pastoral Plan of the Archdiocese for a period of five years should be prepared taking into account the "Synodal Resolutions and Constitutions - 2000" and "The Archdiocesan Survey – 2007". The three member committee comprising of the

Director of Pastoral Center, Senate Secretary and Fr. Antony Packiam, is mandated to do this work in consultation with the Archbishop.

- b) The Roles and Functions of Ecclesiastical Offices in the Archdiocese will be completed soon under the leadership of Vicar General.
- c) A separate meeting for the Diocesan Clergy alone will be convened.
- d) The members of Diocesan CDPI will share the decisions of the regional CDPI Meeting at Monthly recollection.
- e) The Archdiocese will follow all the norms in bifurcating new parishes.
- f) The religious priests notwithstanding their exercise of long term ministry in the Archdiocese, will not be incardinated.
- g) Discussion on exchanging campus between Britto Matric and R. C. Primary is closed. It is not viable.
- h) Archbishop informs the floor that a particular Congregation has volunteered to enter into a contract with the Archdiocese to take up the special Ministry to the Handicapped and Mentally Challenged at the diocesan property (9.32 acres) at Alagarkoil.
- i) In future, Extraordinary Administration such as construction of R.C. Mahal need to obtain the consent of the Senate and the College of Consultors.
- j) Action is initiated to transfer the Titles of individual priests on diocesan property to the Archdiocese of Madurai.
- k) The Education commission would implement the decision of 2011.
- l) It was confirmed that minimum Rs.6000 should be paid to the consolidated pay Teachers at our diocesan Schools.

B. Discussions and Deliberations of Senate: 22nd October 2019

i) Archbishop informed that the Loretto Project has come to the final stage. A Contract between the Archdiocese (A) and a Chennai based businessman (B) will soon be entered. As per the Contract five acres of prime land will be given to B, who will put

up a huge Mall-Shopping Complex at the tune of seventy five crores. B will give A five crores refundable deposit. A will enter into a Contract with B for the period of first ten years, then another ten years and at the completion of twenty years, another ten years, amounting to thirty years. B will complete construction suitable to his business within two years. All the works of obtaining approval and registration belong to B. A will put up a Grotto at the site.

The whole floor appreciated the final decision of the Archdiocese on this huge project and gave certain suggestions: a) We need to fence the other two acres of land b) Instead of a Grotto, a small chapel for the people and commuters around the area could be constructed. c) We should get in writing from B that no other religious symbol or statue or temple should be constructed at the campus of the Complex.

- ii) The Archdiocese could give a report about the Projects to the Senate every year. Details such as the sanctioned amount, to which parishes or institutes, by which Agencies, the amount of local contribution etc., should be submitted.
- iii) Commission reports should be submitted at the Reunion every year. The Co-ordinator of Commission should publish in DNL, the Commission's reports once in three months. In order to know about the works of the Commissions in parishes, the V.F-s have to be invited to attend the Commission Secretaries Meetings.
- iv) Instead of offering Gifts to the *Ordinandi*, which has become the latest custom, the Archbishop will help a particular *Ordinandi* in his financial constraints.
- v) All the parish priests should encourage Vocations, and more so, it is the duty of the Vocation Promoter to concentrate on vocations. In this connection, as per the suggestion of the Senate, Archbishop has announced that we would once again start the APOSTOLIC SCHOOL for boys to be trained from VI or IX Standard.
- vi) The Congrua will be increased as per the suggestions of the Fathers and the financial status of the Archdiocese.
- vii) "KirithavaVazhvurimai Iyakkam" has to be rejuvenated at all the parishes of the Archdiocese.

- viii) Procurator could initiate monitoring of Security Measures and Health safeguards in all the Parish Church campus.
- ix) Packianathapuram parochial church and the rectory will soon be constructed taking into account the current financial situation and the number of other rectories to be completed in the Archdiocese. It was suggested that before erecting a new parish, the basic structure of Presbytery and the church have to be constructed.
- x) Archbishop said that he had initiated action against those who had sold the diocesan property. He warned strictly that penal actions would be initiated on those who had sold diocesan property or changed pattah in their own name.
- xi) Archbishop said that the Bishop's house Chapel would be extended in order to accommodate diocesan level liturgical celebrations and functions.
- xii) Archbishop informed the floor that eighty lakhs has been spent to complete the construction of Working Women Hostel. It was discussed whether we could change the project since such Hostels would be a perennial head-ache to the Archdiocese in the future.
- xiii) The Chancellor has to submit a detailed Report on how many Religious Congregations entered into a Contract with the Archdiocese; whether they are renewed at the lapse of years; whether any congregation has breached the Agreement and what should be the response of the Archdiocese on those Congregations etc.
- xiv) The Excardinated priests' information has to be published in DNL. Chancellor

The participants, numbering around 1200 holding a lighted candle, took resolution to be human, lovable, and to avoid hatred and division on the basis of religion. The celebration came to an end with National anthem and distribution of sweets.

THIRD WORLD DAY OF THE POOR 17 November 2019 The hope of the poor shall not perish for ever (Excerpt from Pope's Message)

1. "The hope of the poor will not perish for ever" (Ps 9:19). These words of the Psalm remain timely. They express a profound truth that faith impresses above all on the hearts of the poor, restoring lost hope in the face of injustice, sufferings and the uncertainties of life.

The Psalmist describes the condition of the poor and the arrogance of those who oppress them (cf. 10, 1-10). He invokes God's judgment to restore justice and overcome evil (cf. 10, 14-15). In his words, we hear an echo of age-old questions. How can God tolerate this disparity? How can he let the poor be humiliated without coming to their aid? Why does he allow oppressors to prosper instead of condemning their conduct, especially in the light of the sufferings of the poor?

The Psalm was composed at a time of great economic development that, as often happens, also led to serious social imbalances. The inequitable distribution of wealth created a significant number of poor

people, whose condition appeared all the more dramatic in comparison with the wealth attained by a privileged few. The Psalmist, observing the situation, paints a picture as realistic as it is true.

It was a time when arrogant and ungodly people hounded the poor, seeking to take possession even of what little they had, and to reduce them to bondage. The situation is not much different today. The economic crisis has not prevented large groups of people from accumulating fortunes that often appear all the more incongruous when, in the streets of our cities, we daily encounter great numbers of the poor who lack the bare necessities of life and are at times harassed and exploited. The words of Book of Revelation come to mind: "You say, I am rich, I have prospered, and I need nothing. You do not realize that you are wretched, pitiable, poor, blind and naked" (Rev 3:17). The centuries pass, but the condition of rich and poor remains constant, as if history has taught us nothing. The words of the Psalm, then, are not about the past, but about our present, as it stands before God's judgement.

2. Today too, we must acknowledge many new forms of bondage that enslave millions of men, women, young people and children.

Daily we encounter families forced to leave their homeland to seek a living elsewhere; orphans who have lost their parents or were violently torn from them by brutal means of exploitation; young people seeking professional fulfilment but prevented from employment by shortsighted economic policies; victims of different kinds of violence, ranging from prostitution to the narcotics trade, and profoundly demeaned. How can we overlook, too, the millions of immigrants who fall victim to any number of concealed interests, often exploited for political advantage, and are refused solidarity and equality? And all the homeless and ostracized persons who roam the streets of our cities?

How many times do we see poor people rummaging through garbage bins to retrieve what others have discarded as superfluous, in the hope of finding something to live on or to wear! They themselves become part of a human garbage bin; they are treated as refuse, without the slightest sense of guilt on the part of those who are complicit in this scandal. Frequently judged parasites on society, the poor are not even forgiven their poverty. Judgment is always around the corner. They are not allowed to be timid or discouraged; they are seen as a threat or simply useless, simply because they are poor.

To make matters worse, they can see no end to the tunnel of extreme poverty. We have come to the point of devising a hostile architecture aimed at ridding the streets of their presence, the last places left to them. They roam from one end of the city to the other in the hope of

getting a job, a home, a sign of affection... The least offer becomes a ray of light; yet even where justice might be expected to prevail, they meet with violence and abuse. Forced to work endless hours under a burning sun to gather seasonal fruits, they receive ridiculously low pay. They labour in unsafe and inhuman conditions that prevent them from feeling on a par with others. They lack unemployment compensation, benefits, or even provision for sickness.

The Psalmist describes with brutal realism the attitude of the rich who rob the poor: "They lie in wait that they may seize the poor... and drag them off in their net" (cf. Ps 10:9). As in a hunt, the poor are trapped, captured and enslaved. As a result, many of them become disheartened, hardened and anxious only to drop out of sight. In a word, we see before us a multitude of poor people often maligned and barely tolerated. They become for all effects invisible and their voice is no longer heard or heeded in society. Men and women who are increasingly strangers amid our houses and outcasts in our neighborhoods.

3. The setting of the Psalm is tinged with sadness at the injustice, the suffering and the disappointment endured by the poor. At the same time, it offers a touching definition of the poor: they are those who "put their trust in the Lord" (cf. v. 10), in the certainty that they will never be forsaken. In the Scriptures, the poor are those who trust! The Psalmist also gives the reason for this trust: they "know" the Lord (cf. ibid.). In the language of the Bible, such "knowledge" involves a personal relationship of affection and love.

Impressive and completely unexpected as this description is, it simply expresses the grandeur of God, as shown in the way he relates to the poor. His creative power surpasses all human expectations and is shown in his being "mindful" of each individual (cf. v. 13). It is precisely this confidence in the Lord, this certainty of not being forsaken, that inculcates hope. The poor know that God cannot abandon them; hence, they live always in the presence of the God who is mindful of them. God's help extends beyond their present state of suffering in order to point out a path of liberation that profoundly strengthens and transforms the heart.

MADURA MISSION - HISTORICAL NOTES

XXX. Madura Mission – Historical Notes

Before focussing on the other great missionaries of new Madura Mission we need to understand the ecclesiastical background of this mission. During the period of St. John de Britto and other missionaries, the Missions of Madura, Malabar, Carnatic etc., were under Padroado system, meaning under the patronage of Portugal king who exercised authority over the mission affairs. Already in 1493, Pope Alexander VI and his successors granted Portugal the right of *Patronage* to be exercised over all the territories they conquered, or to be conquered or discovered by Portugal. Thus Portugal had the monopoly of missions and trade simultaneously. In other words the universal and holy and Catholic Church granted Portugal the right of foundation and endowment of episcopal sees, of parishes and of seminaries. It means Portugal obtained the power to establish dioceses, parishes and seminaries in mission land.

The King had the privilege of appointing and assigning the missionaries and defining the mission area. In 1600 the Bishop of Goa had the jurisdiction over all the south Indian Missions including the Madura mission. But the Church paid its prize through the latter kings of Portugal for mixing God's work with temporal power. Due to anticlerical and free-Masonic governments of Portugal, the missions supported by Portugal were abandoned by her new rulers, and the Society of Jesus itself was suppressed. In 1833 Portugal expelled all the religious men and women from Portuguese India. She wilfully neglected the missions which caused a diplomatic rupture between Portugal and Rome. This came to an end by the timely intervention of Pope Gregory XVI. By the Bull Multa Praeclare the Pope abolished the Padroado system and thus annihilated Goan jurisdiction over the mission areas in south India.

In 1836 in order to free the missions from the clutch of Padroado system, Pope Gregory XVI elevated Pondicherry Mission, as a Vicariate of Coromandal coast. At this time only the four pioneers of New Madura Mission arrived at Madura mission. They found the mission almost in ruin. The Methodists and Lutherans had a great harvest during the period of suppression of the Order. Moreover, the caste system and the village leaders had destroyed the faith of the new converts and many had returned to their old religion or were pulled by the Lutherans and the Anglicans.

In 1847, Fr. Alexis Canoz was appointed as the Vicar Apostolic and was consecrated a Bishop of Trichinopoly, who in his career of forty one

years of episcopacy paved the way for the Mission to become a local church. So many institutions were established in order to educate and liberate the Indians. In 1848, St. Joseph's College was founded at Nagapattanam and later it was shifted to Trichinopolly (in 1883). In 1849 the congregation of Brothers of the Seven Dolours was born in Dindigul in order to train local catechists. In 1888, the Jesuit Novitiate was founded first in Trichy and later in Dindigul, which formed many religious. In 1857 an Orphanage was opened at Adaikalapuram with a grant from Holy Childhood society. In 1860 the Sisters of Mary, the Repairer came to Trichinopoly and established two indigenous congregations, eg., the Franciscan Missionaries of Mary. In 1876 a School for Catechists were started at Palayamcotta which gave so many Catechists to the missions. In the same year indigenous women congregations such as Sisters of Our Lady of Dolours and Sisters of St. Anne of Trichy were founded who were also trained by the French nuns, the Sisters of Mary, the Repairer (Reparation Nuns).

It was 23rd June 1886! A day of great blessing to the Indian Church. It is the day that witnessed a new Concordat between Rome and Portugal being signed by which the INDIAN HIERARCHY was established. All the structures of Vicariates were abolished and in their places the local churches (Dioceses) were established. Goa was elevated to the status of Partriarchate and three bishoprics of Daman, Cochin and Mylapore were attached to it. However, in light of this Concordat, the king of Portugal had the right of Presentation (naming a Bishop) to the sees of Bombay, Mangalore, Quilon and Trichinopoly. This particular Concordat (Agreement between the Holy See and the sovereign countries) was the daring and courageous outcome of the Petrine ministry of Pope Leo XIII. It liberated all the mission countries from the confusion of padroado system.

Immediately in 1887, by the Apostolic Constitution, *Humanae Salutis* Pope Leo XIII raised all the Vicar Apostolics into Bishops and Archbishops. This Constitution was proclaimed in South Indian Bishops Synod held in Bangalore in the same year. Thus Trichinopoly became the suffragan of Bombay Archdiocese. In 1890 Bishop John M. Barthe succeeded Bishop Alexis Canoz. Meanwhile the shift of separation took place between the Jesuit mission and a diocese. During the missionary period of Bishop Barthe, the local church also built sacred edifices with the generous donation from France, since most of the missionaries of the new mission were from France in comparison to the fact that most of the missionaries

of the Old Mission were Portuguese. To name the few, the church of Kuthalur was built by an English lady; La Salette of Kodaikanal was built by the countess d' Oultremont and the church of Pudukottai was built by a French benefactress.

In 1893 by a Papal Decree, all the stations of Madura Mission in the Tanjore district (36 churches and 94 chapels with 21,200 Catholics) were handed over to the Diocese of Mylapore, the newly erected diocese which had personal jurisdiction over fourteen churches in Trichinopoly diocese.

In 1895 Sacred Heart College was opened at Shenbaganur which trained Novices, Juniors and students of Philosophy for the Jesuit missions in India and Ceylon. In 1909 Bishop Barthe received a Co-adjutor Bishop Augustine Faisandier who succeeded Bishop Barthe in 1914. In 1921 Most Rev. Faisandier, the Bishop of Trichinopoly opened St. Paul's Seminary for the training of secular priests of various dioceses in southern India. In 1936 St. Paul's had already 70 students and almost 103 new missionaries had passed from the portal of St. Paul's already then to work in different dioceses. 2021 is the Centenary Jubilee year of St. Paul's Seminary, Trichy.

Now the land which we were talking about was no more a mission land. The erudite Scholar Fr. Huppert SJ says "the end and the aim of Missions is to establish the Catholic Church on a permanent basis" in a particular land. He continues: "after four centuries of labour the Madura mission was deemed to have reached that stage of maturity when the local clergy could be entrusted with all the pastoral care of the diocese."

Thus the coastal area was culled out from Trichinopoly and in 1923 the Diocese of Tuticorin was erected by Pope Pius XI, and Msgr. Francis T. Roche SJ., became its first bishop. As per the new policy of separation between the mission and the diocese, Madura mission retained the high school at Tuticorin and founded Loyola College in Mylapore, Madras. The Mission opened St. Xavier's College at *Palamcotta* in the same year. In 1932 Bishop Faisandier opened St. Augustine Junior Seminary for Minor Seminary formation. In view of what is going to happen to Madurai in 1938, part of Ramnad District with 60,000 Catholics were formed into one unit with 20 parish centers and they were confided to secular clergy. After a missionary episcopal ministry of twenty three years, Bishop Augustine Faisandier died in May 1936, and his successor Peter Leonard SJ became the bishop of Trichinopoly. Here a new epoch and a new horizon began to simmer out in the sky of the Archdiocese.
