Mission IS HIS

This year, we celebrate the Mission Sunday on 24th October 2021 with the theme "We cannot but speak of what we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:20). Mission Sunday is a day set aside for the Catholic Church throughout the world to publicly renew its commitment to the missionary movement. It was announced by Pope Pius XI in 1926 as the day of prayer for missions.



In the Holy Father's message for World Mission Sunday 2021, he says: 'Jesus needs hearts capable of experiencing vocation as a true love story that urges them to go forth to the peripheries of our world as messengers and agents of compassion. It's a moment of grace to express solidarity with our brothers and sisters in Christ who are living in situations of poverty, violence, and oppression. Every parish, school, and community joins in this special event, and every penny, pound, and prayer we give to Missio helps missionaries everywhere continue their work.

Mission Sunday reminds every baptized Catholic of the oneness in Christ's mission all over the world. Every year, on this day, we especially remember all the missionaries whether they have come from elsewhere and working amidst us or those who have traveled from our place, reaching far-off lands to proclaim Christ; as well as our special contribution for the Universal mission.

On this day, each one of us can contribute to the World Mission in fourways: a) Proclaiming the Good News b) Praying for the Missionaries all over the World, c) Contributing materially for the well-being of the missionaries, and d) Living the life of Christ Himself. we express our support of missionaries from all continents who are striving to bring the true love of Christ to all who have yet to receive it.

a) Proclaiming the Good News

St. Francis Xavier the first Jesuit missionary was particularly passionate about spreading the word of God to the far regions of the world. His commitment to the speedy dissemination of the Gospel has led many to call him a "**St. Paul in modern style**". Hence, appreciating

his zeal for the Word of God **Pope Pius XI** declared him the patron saint of all missions.

b) Praying for the Missionaries all over the World

St. Thérèse of Child Jesus had always dreamed of being a missionary, an Apostle, a martyr – yet she just remained a nun in a quiet cloister in France. How then could she be enthroned as **Patroness of all Missionaries and the Missions?** By her <u>little way</u> of loving God and neighbor through her prayers and sacrifices. She used to offer her prayers for the conversion of the sinners, for the release of a prisoner, etc.

c) Contributing materially to the well-being of the missionaries and the development of the missions

Mother Teresa of Calcutta started her mission with only five rupees. People witnessed her selfless service and donated a lot of money. Sisters of Charity are now spread all over the world continuing the mission of Jesus. Mission in our dioceses is flourishing because of the generous contribution of the people abroad. Similarly, it is an occasion for us to generously contribute to the Mission at large.

d) Living the life of Christ Himself

St. John Maria Vianney served as a parish priest just in one parish for 40 years. **He is the epitome and the embodiment of a perfect missionary.** He had a deep thirst to preach the word of God. He was praying for priests, sisters, and people sitting in the Church for many hours. He lived a life of the poor. He was the perfect replica of Jesus Himself.

We are celebrating this year's World Mission Sunday with the theme "We cannot but speak of what we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:20). We experience Jesus by the hard labour of Missionaries of the past. We are entitled to give it back to the future generation the faith we have received. Hence, let us proclaim, let us pray, let us contribute, and above all let us become each one of us a missionary in our walks of life.

MESSAGE OF HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS FOR WORLD MISSION DAY 2021

"We cannot but speak about what we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:20).

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Once we experience the power of God's love, and recognize his fatherly presence in our personal and community life, we cannot help but proclaim and share what we have seen and heard. Jesus' relationship with his disciples and his humanity, as revealed to us in the mystery of his Incarnation, Gospel and Paschal Mystery, shows us the extent to which God loves our humanity and makes his own our joys and sufferings, our hopes and our concerns (cf. Gaudium et Spes, 22). Everything about Christ reminds us that he knows well our world and its need for redemption, and calls us to become actively engaged in this mission: "Go therefore to the highways and byways, and invite everyone

you find" (Mt 22:9). No one is excluded, no one need feel distant or removed from this compassionate love.

The experience of the Apostles: The history of evangelization began with the Lord's own passionate desire to call and enter into friendly dialogue with everyone, just as they are (cf. Jn 15:12-17). The Apostles are the first to tell us this; they remembered even the day and the hour when they first met him: "It was about four o'clock in the afternoon" (Jn 1:39). Experiencing the Lord's friendship, watching him cure the sick, dine with sinners, feed the hungry, draw near to the outcast, touch the unclean, identify with the needy, propose the Beatitudes and teach in a new and authoritative way, left an indelible mark on them, awakening amazement, expansive joy and a profound sense of gratitude. The prophet Jeremiah describes this experience as one of a consuming awareness of the Lord's active presence in our heart, impelling us to mission, regardless of the sacrifices and misunderstandings it may entail (cf. 20:7-9). Love is always on the move, and inspires us to share a wonderful and hope-filled message: "We have found the Messiah" (Jn 1:41).

With Jesus, we too have seen, heard and experienced that things can be different. Even now, he has inaugurated future times, reminding us of an often forgotten dimension of our humanity, namely, that "we were created for a fulfilment that can only be found in love" (FratelliTutti, 68). A future that awakens a faith capable of inspiring new initiatives and shaping communities of men and women who, by learning to accept their own frailty and that of others, promote fraternity and social friendship (cf. ibid., 67). The ecclesial community reveals its splendour whenever it recalls with gratitude that the Lord loved us first (cf. 1 Jn 4:19). "The loving predilection of the Lord surprises us, and surprise by its very nature cannot be owned or imposed by us... Only in this way can the miracle of gratuitousness, the gratuitous gift of self, blossom. Nor can missionary fervour ever be obtained as a result of reasoning or calculation. To be 'in a state of mission' is a reflection of gratitude" (Message to the Pontifical Mission Societies, 21 May 2020).

Even so, things were not always easy. The first Christians began the life of faith amid hostility and hardship. Experiences of marginalization and imprisonment combined with internal and external struggles that seemed to contradict and even negate what they had seen and heard. Yet, rather than a difficulty or an obstacle leading them to step back or close in on themselves, those experiences impelled them to turn problems, conflicts and difficulties into opportunities for mission. Limitations and obstacles became a privileged occasion for anointing everything and everyone with the Spirit of the Lord. Nothing and no one was to be excluded from the message of liberation.

We have a vivid testimony to all this in the Acts of the Apostles, a book which missionary disciples always have within easy reach. There we read how the fragrance of the Gospel spread as it was preached, awakening the joy that the Spirit alone can bestow. The Book of Acts teaches us to endure hardship by clinging firmly to Christ, in order to grow in the "conviction that God is able to act in any circumstance, even amid apparent setbacks" and in the certainty that "all those who entrust themselves to God will bear good fruit" (EvangeliiGaudium, 279).

The same holds true for us: our own times are not easy. The pandemic has brought to the fore and amplified the pain, the solitude, the poverty and the injustices experienced by so many people. It has unmasked our false sense of security and revealed the brokenness and polarization quietly growing in our midst. Those who are most frail and vulnerable have come to feel even more so. We have experienced discouragement, disillusionment and fatigue; nor have we been immune from a growing negativity that stifles hope. For our part, however, "we do not proclaim ourselves, but Jesus Christ as Lord and ourselves as your slaves for Jesus' sake" (2 Cor 4:5). As a result, in our communities and in our families, we can hear the powerful message of life that echoes in our hearts and proclaims: "He is not here, but has risen (Lk 24:6)! This message of hope shatters every form of determinism and, to those who let themselves be touched by it, bestows the freedom and boldness needed to rise up and seek with creativity every possible way to show compassion, the "sacramental" of God's closeness to us, a closeness that abandons no one along the side of the road.

In these days of pandemic, when there is a temptation to disguise and justify indifference and apathy in the name of healthy social distancing, there is urgent need for the mission of compassion, which can make that necessary distancing an opportunity for encounter, care and promotion. "What we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:20), the mercy we have experienced, can thus become a point of reference and a source of

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credibility, enabling us to recover a shared passion for building "a community of belonging and solidarity worthy of our time, our energy and our resources (FratelliTutti, 36). The Lord's word daily rescues and saves us from the excuses that can plunge us into the worst kind of skepticism: "Nothing changes, everything stays the same". To those who wonder why they should give up their security, comforts and pleasures if they can see no important result, our answer will always remain the same: "Jesus Christ has triumphed over sin and death and is now almighty. Jesus Christ is truly alive" (EvangeliiGaudium, 275) and wants us to be alive, fraternal, and capable of cherishing and sharing this message of hope. In our present circumstances, there is an urgent need for missionaries of hope who, anointed by the Lord, can provide a prophetic reminder that no one is saved by himself.

Like the Apostles and the first Christians, we too can say with complete conviction: "We cannot but speak about what we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:20). Everything we have received from the Lord is meant to be put to good use and freely shared with others. Just as the Apostles saw, heard and touched the saving power of Jesus (cf. 1 Jn 1:1-4), we too can daily touch the sorrowful and glorious flesh of Christ. There we can find the courage to share with everyone we meet a destiny of hope, the sure knowledge that the Lord is ever at our side. As Christians, we cannot keep the Lord to ourselves: the Church's evangelizing mission finds outward fulfilment in the transformation of our world and in the care of creation.

An invitation to each of us: The theme of this year's World Mission Day – "We cannot but speak about what we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:20), is a summons to each of us to "own" and to bring to others what we bear in our hearts. This mission has always been the hallmark of the Church, for "she exists to evangelize" (SAINT PAUL VI, Evangelii Nuntiandi, 14). Our life of faith grows weak, loses its prophetic power and its ability to awaken amazement and gratitude when we become isolated and withdraw into little groups. By its very nature, the life of faith calls for a growing openness to embracing everyone, everywhere. The first Christians, far from yielding to the temptation to become an elite group, were inspired by the Lord and his offer of new life to go out among the nations and to bear witness to what they had seen and heard: the good news that the Kingdom of God is at hand.

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They did so with the generosity, gratitude and nobility typical of those who sow seeds in the knowledge that others will enjoy the fruit of their efforts and sacrifice. I like to think that "even those who are most frail, limited and troubled can be missionaries in their own way, for goodness can always be shared, even if it exists alongside many limitations" (Christus Vivit, 239).

On World Mission Day, which we celebrate each year on the penultimate Sunday of October, we recall with gratitude all those men and women who by their testimony of life help us to renew our baptismal commitment to be generous and joyful apostles of the Gospel. Let us remember especially all those who resolutely set out, leaving home and family behind, to bring the Gospel to all those places and people athirst for its saving message.

Contemplating their missionary witness, we are inspired to be courageous ourselves and to beg "the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest" (Lk 10:2). We know that the call to mission is not a thing of the past, or a romantic leftover from earlier times. Today too Jesus needs hearts capable of experiencing vocation as a true love story that urges them to go forth to the peripheries of our world as messengers and agents of compassion. He addresses this call to everyone, and in different ways. We can think of the peripheries all around us, in the heart of our cities or our own families. Universal openness to love has a dimension that is not geographical but existential. Always, but especially in these times of pandemic, it is important to grow in our daily ability to widen our circle, to reach out to others who, albeit physically close to us, are not immediately part of our "circle of interests" (cf. FratelliTutti, 97). To be on mission is to be willing to think as Christ does, to believe with him that those around us are also my brothers and sisters. May his compassionate love touch our hearts and make us all true missionary disciples.

May Mary, the first missionary disciple, increase in all the baptized the desire to be salt and light in our lands (cf. Mt 5:13-14).

<u>Historical Notes – Madura Mission</u>

XLVIII On the Footsteps of our Elder Brothers

Fr. J. Maria Pancras: Fr. Pancras served the parishes of Kamanayakkanpatti, Silukkuvarpatti, Kalladithidal, Koothalur and Ramanathapuram as the Assistant Parish Priest and at the parishes of Satharasanpatti, Michaelpattanam and Theni as Parish Priest. He celebrated his Silver Jubilee in March 1984 at Theni when he was the parish priest. He passed away on 06-9-1992. May the glorious name of Fr. Maria Pancras long live at the annals of the Archdiocese.

Fr. Vedamuthu S.: Fr. Vedamuthu was born in 1908 at Kalloorani village of Michaelpattanam parish, the present Sivagangai diocese. The very stature of him was gigantic; a tall man with a gigantic look which marked him as an achiever. He was ordained in 1937 by Bishop Leonard. He was ministering as an Assitant Parish Priest at Malayadipatti, Puliyal and Sooranam.

He was appointed as the Parish Priest of SalaiKiramam for a shorter period and later he was transferred to Kalladithidal parish. There too he was ministering for a few years.

From then on he was appointed as Parish Priest of Susaiappparpattanam in 1949 he was ministering there for 10 long years (1949 – 1959). He used to visit his flock door by door and therefore the flock loved him so much. He was instrumental in developing *CatholikkuSevaSangam*at this parish. He visited every village and founded this Sangam which helped the people for their all round development. He upgraded primary Schools into Middle. Through SevaSangam he received Harvest Offering which he used for the educational fees for the students. SevaSangam used this corpus fund to give low rate interest to the students who wanted to study further. Thus many students benefitted by this monitary scheme.

He had a very powerful voice which reflected in his sermons. As he was interested in sports as well he encouraged his flock to join in games and sports. He used to teach regular Catechism to the elderly people during Sundays.

He renovated the Church of Susaiapparpattanam and constructed a tower to the church. He too had a pastoral vision to start a High School at Kalayarkoil and since the permission was not granted he could not start that project. However, he is the pioneer for the creation of that parish since he was the one who prepared the work by purchasing the land for the Church there.

Seeing his dedication and administration the Archbishop appointed him as the Vicar Forane of Sarugani. Then considering the easy accessibility and travel convenience he requested to change the vicariate center from Sarugani to Devakottai and it was done. He was administering as Vicar Forane for six years.

Then he was appointed as the Care Taker of Periyur Coffee Estate for a year. As the climate was not conducive for his health he was transferred to Aathoor as the parish priest where he renovated the parochial church. He was doing ground work at Chinnalapatti to make it a new parish later. Then he was transferred to Sivagangai where he involved his parishioner in social and developmental works.

Again he was appointed as the Vicar Forane of Devakottai the second time and he became the Director of ValanIllam, the Orphanage. He renovated the church at Devakottai. Remaining at Devakottai he constructed SindadiriMadha Church at Thondi; thus helped the fisherfolk community to grow in faith. Many chapels and churches he built in villages. He also spearheaded Draught Relief works and Co-operative Society projects in his parishes.

In 1977 Fr. Balthazar became the parish priest of Devakottai and in 1978 Fr. Rajasekaran replaced him as the Vicar Forane of Devakottai. In 1979 having considering his health condition he was also relieved from the Directorship of the Orphanage and he went for rest.

At his retirement he spent most of his time in prayer and solitude. Following his regular habits of spiritual reading, walking, prayer and diet he lived his old age gracefully. On 8th October 1984 he was suffering from high blood pressure due to which he collapsed and was admitted at Dindigul St. Joseph hospital and there he reached his heavenly abode on 1-12-1984. Listening to the plea of the parishioners of Susaiapparpattanam, who loved their beloved pastor so much the

Archbishop gave permission to bury on 2nd December 1984, the beloved pastor at the Church of Susaiapparpattanam itself. (*to be continued*)

October - Month of Rosary

The month of October is dedicated to the Holy Rosaryand the best way to celebrate the month is, of course, to pray the Rosary.

On October 7, 1571, a great victory over the mighty
Turkish fleet was won by Catholic naval forces primarily
from Spain, Venice, and Genoa under the command of
Don Juan of Austria. It was the last battle at sea between
"oared" ships, which featured the most powerful navy
in the world, a Moslem force with between 12,000 to 15,000 Christian
slaves as rowers.

The patchwork team of Catholic ships was powered by the Holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Knowing that the Christian forces were at a distinct material disadvantage, the holy pontiff, St. Pope Pius V called for all of Europe to pray the Rosary for victory. We know today that the victory was significant, prevented the Islamic invasion of Europe, and evidenced the Hand of God working through Our Lady. One of three admirals commanding the Catholic forces at Lepanto was Andrea Doria. He carried a small copy of Mexico's Our Lady of Guadalupe into battle. This image is now enshrined in the Church of San Stefano in Aveto, Italy.

At Lepanto, the Victory over the Moslems was won by the faithful praying the Rosary. Even though they had superior numbers, the Turks really were overmatched. Blessed Padre Pio, the Spiritual Father of the Blue Army, said: "The Rosary is the weapon." The Battle of Lepanto was at first celebrated liturgically as "Our Lady of Victory." Later, the feast of October 7th was renamed "Our Lady of the Rosary" and extended throughout the Universal Church by Pope Clement XI in 1716 (who canonized Pope Pius V in 1712).

And with that we are back to Fatima, Portugal where Our Lady, when asked her name, said: "I am the Lady of the Rosary." At Fatima, Our Lady taught us to pray the Rosary every day.

Our Lady of the Rosary, Pray for us
